The book concludes with bits and pieces of a theory of physiology and psychology, systems he would not work out in full until the publication of The Passions of the Soul in 1649. The first strictly philosophical section of the Principles is largely a restatement of the conclusions Descartes drew in his earlier philosophical work, Meditations on First Philosophy.

Passions Of The Soul Rene

In the late 20th and early 21st centuries, it is quite common for philosophers to accuse Descartes of ignoring the visceral and emotional aspects of life and equating all thought with reason alone. In THE PASSIONS OF THE SOUL he belies this reading with the proclamation, "all the good and evil of this life depend on [the passions] alone".
